# How to build a strong debate argument

#### What is an argument?

An argument is a claim which has to be proved with the use of logical reasoning, examples, and research.

#### Structure

- Introduction
- Thesis statement
- Supporting Paragraphs
- Constructing Topic Sentences
- Building Main Points
- Countering the Opposition
- Conclusion

- The structure of the debate arguments are quite similar to the ones of an essay
- Start with the <u>introduction</u> where you want to, first of all, catch the listeners' attention. Then move on to present your argument
- Thesis statement: also called a 'proposition', it is what you are going to try to convince the listeners of. This is what you will be defending for the rest of your talk.

## Supporting paragraphs


• Topic sentence



Explanation and logic



• Primary Example (This is the most salient or obvious example to support your argument.)



Link example to logic



Secondary Example

## Counterarguments

- Your argument will face opposition;
- Handle your resistance adequately at various points within your supporting paragraphs.
- Avoid hostile language

### Conclusion

- Restate your initial argument
- Avoid adding any new information
